II. ALPHABETICAL LIST

- ADAIR (Alexander) stationer in Ayr, 1691. Adair granted a bond to an Ayr merchant for 153 pounds Scots, 8 Feb. 1691. (Dal. lxxiii, 464. RD Index, xxxi.)
- ADAMSON (William) porter and bookbinder in St Andrews, 1684-96. (Carnie II [SB, xiv] 85.)
- AIKENHEAD (Patrick) stationer in Glasgow, 3 Oct. 1679. (BGBG.)
- AIR, ARR, or AY (Richard) cleric and bookbinder, Glasgow, 1432. There is some doubt as to the correct transcription of the surname. Mitchell retains the form AIR. (Mitchell, 1, 118.)
- AITCHISON (James) journeyman printer in the King's House, Edinburgh, 1678. One of the workmen who applied to the Lords to recommend the Edinburgh Town Council to free them from watching and warding duties in the burgh. (PC Reg. Ser. 3, v, 441-2.)
- AITON (Hector) journeyman printer in Edinburgh, 1681. One of the three printers who tried to affiliate themselves with the hammermen trade, and temporarily lost their burgh tickets because of this act, 8 June 1681. (ERBE 1681-9.)
- ALLAN (John) bookbinder in Aberdeen, 1613. Fined on 13 April 1613 for playing golf in the kirk yard. (Mitchell, 118.)
- ANNAND (John) journeyman printer in Edinburgh, 1678-81. Annand was working in the King's House in 1678. His name appears in a document registered 18 April 1681. (RD Index, xxi. Mack. xlvi, 1030.)
- ANNAND (William) journeyman printer in Edinburgh, 1678. One of the workmen in the King's House. (PC Reg. Ser. 3, v, 441-2.)
- AUCHMOWTIE (James) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1612. (Mitchell, 118.)
- AUCHTERLONIE (John) stationer and bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1639-49 [1678?] Mitchell lists the known period of activity of this man as 1639-49. His son, James Auchterlony, was apprenticed to a cordiner in 1678. His father is not described as deceased in the entry. 24 April 1678. (Mitchell, 119. ERA 1666-1700.)
- B. (I.) printer, Edinburgh, 1670. (See supra, no. 1894.5.)
- BALFOUR (William) Englishman, printer to His Majesty in Edinburgh, 31 July 1650. (ERBE 1642-55.)
- BALMAINE (James) journeyman printer in Edinburgh, 1678. One of the workmen in the King's House. (PC Reg. Ser. 3, v, 441-2.)
- BELFRAGE (George) burgess, stationer and bookbinder in Kirkcaldy, 1679-80. Belfrage was granted a bond by James Taylor for 30 pounds Scots. Deed registered 28 Oct. 1679. His spouse, Isobel Mitchelson, was grantee of bond 15 Nov. 1680. (RD Index, xix-xx. Dur. xlvi, 437. Dal. liii, 187.)
- BELL (Adam) burgess and printer in Edinburgh, 1676. Bell granted a bond by an Edinburgh tailor. Bond registered 14 Nov. 1676. (RD Index, xvi. Dal. xlii, 605.)
- BLACK (James) glazier and stationer in Perth, 1696. (Carnie II [SB, xiv] 87.)
- BLACK (Patrick) glazier and stationer in Perth, 1687. (Carnie II [SB, xiv] 87.)
- BOGLE or BOYLE (David) bookbinder in Irvine, 1686. In April 1686 Boyle was owing John Semple, merchant in Irvine, 15 merks. The deed is witnessed by John Weir, servitor to David Boyle. (RD Index, xxvi. Dur. lxxv, 55.)
- BOGLE (William) bookbinder in Glasgow, 1657. Will recorded, 30 July 1657. (RTG.)
- BONKILL (William) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1501. (Mitchell, 17, 119.)
- BRISBANE (Andrew) stationer in Glasgow, 1680. In a dispute between William Stewart, stationer in Paisley, and Andrew Brisbane, stationer in Glasgow, Robert Stewart and George Brown, stationers in Glasgow, were appointed to arbitrate. Stewart had to pay 12 pounds Scots to Brisbane. Document registered 11 May 1680. (RD Index, xx. Dur. xlvii, 428.)
- BROWN (Andrew) stationer and bookbinder in Glasgow, 1676-97. Burgess and guild brother 27 July 1676. Grantee of bond for 200 pounds Scots, 15 June 1688. Witness to a bond relating to Robert Herbertsone, bookbinder in Glasgow, registered 27 Jan. 1681. A payment was made of a pension to Andrew Brown, bookbinder in Glasgow, 17 April 1697 by the Town Council on account of his poverty and large family. (BGBG. RD Index, xxi, xxviii. Dal. liii, 785. Dur. lxxviii, 454. BRG.)

- BROWN (Francis) stationer in Kilmarnock, 1684. Brown granted a bond to George Pollok, minister, early in 1684 for 500 pounds Scots money. The document is witnessed by David Mair, servitor to Francis Brown. (RD Index, xxiv. Dur. lviii, 294.)
- BROWN (George) bookbinder in Glasgow, 1659. Burgess as serving apprenticeship with deceased James Winchester, bookbinder, 24 Feb. 1659. (BGBG.) May be the same as George Brown, bookseller, 1676.
- BROWN (James) bookbinder in Glasgow, 1661-80. Burgess as serving apprenticeship with Robert Sanders, bookbinder, 24 Jan. 1661 and guild brother by the same right, 20 Jan. 1670. He was prentice master to John Stevinstone, 30 Sept. 1680. (BGBG.) May be the same as James Brown, bookseller, 1676-85.
- BROWN (John) printer in Edinburgh, 1662-8. Brown is to be found as a principal in a number of bonds and other documents between 1662 and 1665. That he was deceased by 1668 is made clear by a document entered by his creditors registered 29 Jan. 1668. (RD Index, 11, 111, v, viii. Dur. iv, 293. Dal. ix, 25; xiv, 36. Dur. xvii, 392.)
- BROWN (John) journeyman printer in Edinburgh, 1678. Employed in the King's House. Clearly a different man from the previous entry. (PC Reg. Ser. 3, v, 441-2.)
- BUSBIE (Andrew) printer in Edinburgh, 1678. Granter of a bond registered 22 Oct. 1678. (RD Index, xviii. Dal. xvii, 48.)
- BUSBIE (James) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1648. (Mitchell, 119.)
- BUSBIE (William) printer in Edinburgh before 1672. On 30 Oct. 1672, Gideon Busbie, son to the late William Busbie, printer in Edinburgh, was apprenticed to James Bell, bookbinder. Busbie junior was presumably also of Edinburgh. He served his apprenticeship with Gideon Lithgow, printer. (ERA 1666-1700. ERA 1583-1666.)
- CAMPBELL (Beatrix) relict of Archibald Hislop, bookseller in Edinburgh, 1679-80. Hislop's will was registered 10 July 1679. (See supra, p.115.) His relict and his heirs may still have been in business in 1680 for they were paid 4 Feb. 1680 for binding work done for Foulis of Ravelston. The widow's name, Beatrix Campbell, is derived from a discharge, registered 15 Jan. 1673, where she is described as the spouse of Archibald Hislop, bookseller in Edinburgh. (Foulis, 22.)
- CAMPBELL (Thomas) bookseller in Edinburgh, 1664. Granter of a bond registered 8 Dec. 1664. (RD Index, iv. Mack. xi, 880.)
- CATHCART (David) stationer in Edinburgh, 1682-8. Cathcart took his brother-german, Robert Cathcart, as apprentice, which fact was registered on 22 Feb. 1682. He is also a principal in a legal document of 1688. (ERA 1666-1700. RD Index, xxviii. Dal. lxix, 210.)
- CATHCART (Robert) bookbinder in Kelso, 1694. This is possibly the same man as the apprentice in the previous entry. In August 1694 he was indebted to James Hamilton for 120 pounds 17 shillings Scots money. (RD Index, xxxiv. Mack. lxxiv, 1007.)
- CHALMERS (James) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1460. The second earliest recorded Scottish binder. (Mitchell, 1, 119.)
- CHALMERS (James) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1606. (Mitchell, 119.)
- CHRISTIE (George) bookbinder [and chapman?] in Edinburgh, 1619. (Mitchell, 120.)
- CLERK (Donald) bookbinder in Glasgow, 1666. Clerk was involved in a settlement with his brother-in-law, William Lyall. Decree registered 19 Dec. 1666. (RD Index, vi. Dur. xiv, 95.)
- CROSSEY (John) publisher [Edinburgh?] 1700. (See supra, no. 4018.)
- CRUIKSHANK (Alexander) bookbinder in Old Aberdeen, 1628-36. There are two references to this tradesman in the Old Aberdeen records. (ROA, 1, 362; 11, 7.)
- CULROSS (A monk of) bookbinder in Culross, 1513. Bound and illuminated two books of the King's Chapel, Stirling. The next Culross binder known to the compiler was one John Short in 1707, some 195 years later. (Mitchell, 120.)
- CUNNINGHAM (John) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1691-6. Cunningham registered two apprentices, Matthew Tweedie, 15 April 1691, and Thomas Pillans, 23 Dec. 1696. (ERA 1666-1700.)
- CUNNINGHAM (Walter) bookseller and stationer in Edinburgh, 1680-9. There is evidence in the register of deeds that Cunningham was engaged in business transactions with London tradesmen, including Moses Pitt, stationer. He also sold books to Edinburgh University Library in 1681, and is described as a burgess. His apprenticeship to Gideon Shaw was registered 27 Nov. 1667. (EUL MS. RD Index, xx, xxii-xxiii, xxv, xxviii-xxix. Dur. xlvi, 90; liv, 384; lvi, 33. Dal. lx, 852; lxix, 317; lxx, 365. Mack. lvii, 449.)

CUNNINGHAM (William) bookseller and stationer in Edinburgh, 1678-82. Cunningham registered Robert Thomson as apprentice, 15 May 1678. He had financial connections with Robert Coulter, bookseller in London. He was dead by 1682, when his wife, Isobel Anderson, is described in a revocation as his relict. (RD Index, xviii, xxii. Dal. xlvi, 342; xlvi, 251, 407. Mack. xliii, 269; 1, 556. ERA 1666-1700.)

CURRIE (Robert) burgess and stationer in Edinburgh, 1682-93. Registered as apprentices Alexander Urquhart, 19 April 1682, and John Nicol, 9 Feb. 1687. He and others were principals in a bond of corroboration in 1688. On 25 Feb. 1687 he had transferred to him Agnes Campbell's right to install 'presses' behind the Bibliothek (University Library). (ERA 1666-1700. RD Index, xxviii, xxx, xxxiii. Dur. lxxvii, 524; lxxiii, 725. Mack. lxxiii, 1285. EREB 1681-9, 198.)

DALGLEISH (James) bookbinder and stationer in Stirling, 1675-9. He is described in the 1679 bond as a burgess of Stirling. (RD Index, xv, xix. Dal. xxxix, 596; xlvi, 415.)

DESCHAMPS (Nicholas) papermaker at Dalry Mill near Edinburgh, 1681. Archibald Home (q.v.) merchant in Edinburgh, owed Deschamps 250 pounds Scots. Bond registered 4 April 1681. (RD Index, xxi. Dal. liv, 333.)

DICKSON (George) bookseller, parchment-maker and bookbinder in Perth, 1653. (Carnie III, 32.)

DUNCAN (Matthew) bookseller in Kilmarnock, 1695. (See supra, no. 3438.)

DUNLOP (John) bookbinder [in Peebles?] 1630. (Mitchell, 94, 120.)

DUPYNE (Nicholas) papermaker at Yester and Braid, near Edinburgh, 1694-. (Carnie II [SB, xiv] 88.)

EDWARD (Robert) minister and bookseller in Edinburgh, 1692. (Carnie II [SB, xiv] 92.)

FALCONER (John) bookbinder in Glasgow, 2 March 1648. (BGEG.) May be the same as John Falconer, bookseller, 1659-62.

FALCONER (John) bookbinder in Glasgow, 17 March 1693. (BGEG.)

FALCONER (Michael) stationer in Glasgow, 1680. Burgess and guild brother as third lawful son to John Falconer, bookbinder, 12 Oct. 1680. (BGEG.)

FENNEDER (John) barber, parchment-maker and bookbinder in Perth, 1619. (Carnie III, 33.)

FINNELL (John) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1610. (Mitchell, 121.)

FORMAN (Thomas) bookbinder and burgess in Edinburgh, 1634. (Mitchell, 121.)

FORRESTER (John) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1642-81. Mitchell is aware of his activities from 1642 to 1650, and lists his two apprentices, John Lindsay and Alexander Crawford. Forrester and his spouse, Janet Williamson, appear as principals in numerous deeds from 1664 to 1681. (RD Index, iv-v, xii, xxi. Dur. ix, 285; xxxi, 162. Dal. xiv, 703; liii, 587. ERA 1583-1666. Mitchell, 121.)

FOSTER (John) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1646. (Mitchell, 121.)

FREEBAIRN (David) minister, bishop and bookseller in Edinburgh, 1689-1739. One of the 'Killiecrankie stationers' and father of the Pretender's printer, Robert Freebairn. W. J. Couper's article on the latter suggests that his father entered the bookselling business just after the Revolution. He was certainly in business in 1703. This entry corrects that in Carnie I. (Carnie I, 144. W. J. Couper, The Pretender's Printer. [Scottish Historical Review, xv, 1918, 106-23.]

GALT or GALL (James) bookbinder, bookseller and stationer in Glasgow, 1658-83. Burgess as serving apprenticeship with James Dunlop, bookbinder, 1 July 1658. Guild brother by the same right 20 Jan. 1670. Amongst the people to whom Galt was indebted were Robert Currie of Edinburgh and James Bogill, merchant in Glasgow. The bond registered 11 May 1676 was witnessed by James Brown, bookbinder and burgess in Glasgow, and Robert Herbertson, bookseller (q.v.) He is listed by Plomer. (BGEG. RTG. RD Index, xvi, xxii-xxiii. Dal. xli, 553; lix, 553; lxi, 233. Plomer II, 123.)

GALT (William) stationer in Edinburgh, 1676. Galt registered an apprentice, David Wilson, 15 March 1676. (ERA 1666-1700.)

GEDDES (John) stationer and bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1673-88. Geddes was grantee of a disposition registered 25 Dec. 1673. He was dead by 1688 when his relict, Helen Davidson, appears as principal in a deed. He would, therefore, seem to be a different man from the bookseller named in the following entry. John Geddes, stationer, registered an apprentice, James Reid, 24 May 1676. (ERA 1666-1700. RD Index, xliii, xxix. Dur. xxxv, 15. Mack. lxiv, 245.)

GEDDES (John) bookseller in Edinburgh, 1699. This Geddes bought a book from Edinburgh University Library, 10 Oct. 1699. He would seem to be a different man from the one named in the preceding entry. (Carnie I, 145.)

- GIB (William) bookbinder and bookseller in Edinburgh, 1673-83. Gib is described as a bookseller in a bond dated 17 June 1673. As a bookbinder he registered an apprentice, Robert Prymrose, 28 Nov. 1683. Gib served his apprenticeship with John Lillie (q.v.) (ERA 1666-1700. RD Index, xiii. Mack. xxxiii, 439.)
- GIBSON (James) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1603-before 1630. (Mitchell, 121.)
- GLEN (Alexander) journeyman printer in Edinburgh [1678?] This Glen was employed in the King's House. He is described as 'Mr' Alexander Glen, implying that he was a graduate. It is possible, therefore, that his function in the King's House may not have been that of a journeyman. (PC Reg. Ser. 3, v, 441-2.)
- GLEN (Hugh) stationer in Edinburgh before 1691. The sole record of this tradesman is that his son James Glen was registered as apprentice to a wright, 2 Dec. 1691. (ERA 1666-1700.)
- GORDON (John) bookbinder [in Banff?] before 1678. In the extracts from the register of births there is listed James, son of John Gordon, bookbinder, and Isobell Fyffe, his spouse. (Banff, ii, 287.)
- HAGEN (Francis van) bookbinder in Aberdeen, c.1626-36. (Mitchell, 98-100, 126.)
- HAGEN (Patrick or Peter van) bookbinder in Aberdeen, 1643-65. (Mitchell, 100-2, 126.)
- HAINNEY or HYNNEM (Robert) bookbinder in Dumfries. 1670-1. This tradesman is mentioned in the Dumfries Town Council records. (Shirley, Dumfries Printers of the Eighteenth Century. [Transactions of the Dumfriesshire and Galloway Natural History and Antiquarian Society, xviii.] Dumfries, 1934.)
- HAMILTON (James) of Little Earnock, papermaker at Restalrig near Edinburgh, 1691-3. (Carnie II [SB, xiv] 95.)
- HAMILTON (John) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1658. Hamilton registered Patrick Wodrow as his apprentice, 8 Dec. 1658. (ERA 1583-1666.)
- HAY (Alexander) stationer in Edinburgh, 1681. Alexander Hay, son to the deceased Gilbert Hay, sometime Chamberlain to the Earl of Cassilis, granted a discharge on debts in a document registered 4 March 1681. (RD Index, xxi. Dal. liv, 314.)
- HENDERSON (Robert) [warehousekeeper to the White Paper Company, Edinburgh?] 1699-1703. (Carnie II [SB, xiv] 95.)
- HEPBURN (James) journeyman printer in Edinburgh, 1675-8. Hepburn describes himself in a bond registered 25 March 1675 as a servitor to Andrew Anderson, His Majesty's printer. This is confirmed in 1678 when he is named as a workman in the King's House. (RD Index, xv. Mack. xxxvii, 859. PC Reg. Ser. 3, v, 441-2.)
- HERBERTSON (Robert) bookbinder and stationer in Glasgow, after 1676 to 1684. Herbertson was a witness to a bond concerning James Galt in 1676 where he is described as Robert Herbertson, servitor to James Galt. By 1681 he was in business on his own, as is evidenced by a document registered 27 Jan. 1681 describing him as Robert Herbertson, bookbinder in Glasgow. This latter document was witnessed by Andrew Brown (q.v.) and William Dickie (see supra, p.112), bookbinders in Glasgow. He is described as stationer in a 1684 document. (RD Index, xxi, xxiv. Dal. liii, 785. Dur. lviii, 687.)
- HOLIDAY (George) printer in Edinburgh, 1664. (See supra, no. 1784.3.)
- HOME (Archibald) papermaker at Dalry Mill near Edinburgh, 1675. (Carnie II [SB, xiv] 96. See supra, Deschamps, p.183.)
- IRVINE (Alexander) bookbinder in Aberdeen, 1663-71. Irvine registered William Milne (q.v.) as an apprentice 8 July 1671. There is a discharge dated 1663/4 for the binding of a court book. (ROA, i, 236.)
- JORNAW (Thomas) bookbinder in Edinburgh before 1638. Jornaw's career as a journeyman or master must have been limited for he was apprenticed to Robert Woodhouse in 1630 (registered 17 March) and was dead before 20 September 1638. (Mitchell, 122.)
- KEEBIL (William) bookbinder in Forres, 1678-85. Keebil was a principal in a bond registered in 1685. He subscribed the original document 16 August 1678. (RD Index, xxv. Dur. lxii, 78.)
- KER (William) [journeyman?] printer in Aberdeen, 1667. Andrew Ker, son to William Ker, printer in Aberdeen, was apprenticed to Joseph Storie (q.v.), printer in Edinburgh. Apprenticeship registered 28 August 1667. (ERA 1666-1700.)
- KINCAID (Patrick) embroiderer and bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1542-3. (Mitchell, 21, 122.)
- KIRK (James) bookseller in Edinburgh, 1672. Kirk sold books to Edinburgh University Library in that year. (EUL MSS.)

KNOWLIS (Christopher) bookbinder and stationer in Edinburgh, 1671-5. Knowlls is described both as a stationer and as a bookbinder in various bonds and discharges. (RD Index, xi, xv. Mack. xxix, 736. Dur. xxvi, 225. Dal. xxxix, 247.)

LAUDER (Andrew) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1587-1603. (Mitchell, 123.)

LAURIE (George) stationer in Glasgow, 1697. Prentice master to John Robertson, stationer, 6 Dec. 1697. (BGBC.)

LAW (John) journeyman printer in Edinburgh, 1678-82. Law was employed in the King's House in 1678. In a bond registered 4 Jan. 1682 he describes himself as John Law, servitor to Agnes Campbell, relict of the deceased Andrew Anderson, printer to his Majesty in Edinburgh. (PC Reg. Ser. 3, v, 441-2. RD Index, xxii. Dur. li, 271.)

LAWSON (Alexander) bookbinder [in Edinburgh?] 1680-2. Lawson was binding registers and account books for Foulis of Ravelston between the above dates. (Foulis, 39, 45, 86.)

LEIPER (John) parchment-maker in West Newtoun, 1662. Leiper was grantee of a bond registered 28 May 1662. He had a son called Robert. (RD Index, ii. Dal. v, 218.)

LESSLIE (David) bookseller in Edinburgh, 1676-[1698?] Lesslie sold books to Clerk of Penicuik in 1676. He may be the Mr Lesslie who sold books to Edinburgh University Library on 18 March 1698. (Carnie I, 147. Clerk MSS.)

LIGHTBODY (Alexander) journeyman printer in Edinburgh, 1678. Lightbody was one of the workmen in the King's House. (PC Reg. Ser. 3, v, 441-2.)

LIGHTBODY (James) journeyman printer in Edinburgh and Glasgow, 1660-78. Lightbody was a key figure in the history of printing in Glasgow who has been ignored because he was not a master printer. In July 1660 he was a principal party in an agreement with the Glasgow stationers, Robert Sanders, David Neill and George Lawrie, whereby he would operate the printing house they had just set up and train as printers apprentices attached to the house. By 1678 he seems to have moved to the King's House in Edinburgh. (PC Reg. Ser. 3, v, 441-2. RD Index, v. Dal. xiv, 592.)

LILLIE (John) stationer and bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1638-55. Lillie, who began his own apprenticeship with James Harrower, trained William Gib in his shop. Gib was registered 11 June 1656. (Mitchell, 123. ERA 1583-1666.)

LITHGOW (James) papermaker at Upper Spylaw, Colinton, near Edinburgh, 1682. (Carnie II [SB, xv] 106.)

LIVINGSTONE (William) bookseller in Lanark, 1683-4. Livingstone was in debt to Robert Currie. The original document was signed 27 April 1683, and registered in 1684. (RD Index, xxiv. Dur. lix, 357.)

LOCKHART (Robert) stationer, bookbinder and bookseller in Edinburgh, 1665-73. Granter of a bond registered 6 July 1665 in which he is described as a bookbinder. Described as a bookseller in 1670 and as a stationer in 1671. He appears again as a granter of a bond registered 20 August 1673 in which he is described as a stationer. (RD Index, v, x-xi, xiii. Mack. xiv, 55; xxvi, 401; xxxiii, 696. Dur. xxv, 269. Dal. xxix, 208.)

M'CRAE (Andrew) stationer in Ayr, 1669. Will of Marion Dalrymple, spouse to Andrew M'Crae, stationer, burgess of Ayr, recorded, 18 March 1669. (RTG.)

MANES (Denis) papermaker at Yester and Braid, near Edinburgh, 1695-7. (Carnie II [SB, xv] 109.)

MARSHALL (James) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1632. (Mitchell, 123.)

MARSHALL (William) bookbinder [and bookseller?] in Edinburgh, 1620-39. (Mitchell, 123.)

MARSHALL (William) printer in Edinburgh, 1632. This Marshall registered David Macauley as his apprentice on 25 April 1632. It is possible that he is the same man as the one listed in the preceding entry. (ERA 1583-1666.)

MEIN (John) bookseller or stationer in Edinburgh, 1666-7. The Glasgow Burgh Records list a payment to this Edinburgh man for supplying a gazette and other materials. (BRG 1663-90, 492.)

MELVILL (Robert) bookseller, bookbinder and clock-minder in Aberdeen, 1630-45. (Mitchell, 88, 94, 124.)

MERCHISTONE (Robert) bookseller in Edinburgh, 1695. (Carnie I, 149.)

MILNE (Robert) bookbinder in Old Aberdeen, 1676-1715. Milne is first mentioned in the account books of Old Aberdeen, 8 July 1676. In 1690 the Town Council minutes show him as a cautioner for his brother-in-law, and in 1696 he and his wife paid a poll-tax of 18 shillings. He continued as a tradesman into the 18th century. (ROA, i, 153, 237, 366; ii, 271.)

- MILNE (William) bookbinder in Old Aberdeen, after 1671 and before 1686. This Milne served his apprenticeship with Alexander Irvine (q.v.) and worked as journeyman with him. He was dead by 1686 for on 20 March of that year his relict, Methilda Angus, laid a complaint with the Town Council. His widow survived until 1696 when she paid a poll-tax of 6 shillings. (ROA, 1, 141, 365. APT.)
- MITCHELL (Andrew) bookseller and bookbinder in Aberdeen, 1692-96. Mitchell was licensed, 23 August 1692, to sell all kinds of books, whether imported by himself or other burgesses of the city. He is to be found listed amongst the pollable persons of the shire of Aberdeen in 1696. (ABR, 11. APT.)
- MONTEITH (James) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1665. Granter of a bond for 24 pounds 10 shillings Scots. The bond was registered 18 August 1665. (RD Index, v. Mack. xiv, 379.)
- MONTEITH (John) Englishman, printer to His Majesty in Edinburgh, 1650. (ERBE 1642-55, 252.)
- MONTGOMERY (James) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1686. Montgomery, along with William Aitken, bookbinder (see supra, p.107), acted as cautioner for one John Thomson. The original document was subscribed 17 Nov. 1686 and registered in 1687. (RD Index, xxvii. Dal. lxviii, 1246.)
- MORESOUN (John) bookbinder in Glasgow, 1643-64. Burgess as serving apprenticeship with John Wilson, merchant and bookbinder, 5 Oct. 1643. Prentice master to Alexander Moresoune, 1 Dec. 1664. (BGBG.) Probably the same as John Morison, bookseller, 1659-62.
- MORESOUNE (Alexander) bookbinder in Glasgow, 1664. Burgess as serving apprenticeship with John Moresoun, bookbinder, 1 Dec. 1664. (BGBG.)
- MORISON (Francis) glazier, bookbinder and stationer in Perth (c.1670-c.1740). If Bushnell's approximate dates, as given above, are correct, then Francis Morison deserves a place in this list. He was not, however, admitted freeman of the wright craft until 20 August 1706 which suggests that he belongs in an 18th-century list. (Carnie III, 35. PBD, 335.)
- MUILD (John) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1638. (Mitchell, 124.)
- MUIR (Alexander) bookseller in Glasgow, 1599. He admitted selling and receiving books, 31 Oct. 1599. (Registers of the Presbytery of Glasgow [Miscellany of the Maitland Club, 1, 1840] 94.)
- NEILL (David) stationer in Glasgow, 1667. Will recorded, 29 July 1667. (RTG.) The same as the following?
- NEILL (David) bookbinder in Glasgow, 1669. Prentice master to Robert Stewart, merchant, 2 Dec. 1669. (BGBG.) The same as the above?
- NEILL (John) bookbinder in Glasgow, 1649. Prentice master to James Dunlop, bookbinder, 3 August 1649. (BGBG.) May be the same as John Neill, bookseller, 1642-5.
- NEILL (Patrick) bookbinder in Glasgow, 12 Dec. 1691. (BGBG.)
- NICOL (John) bookseller in Edinburgh, 1670-6. Nicol sold books to Edinburgh University Library in 1676. His name is also found as selling books to Lauder of Fountainhall six years earlier. (EUL MSS. Lauder.)
- NICOLL (Patrick) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1628-42. (Mitchell, 124.)
- NICOLSON (John) stationer and bookseller in Edinburgh, 1680-90. This burgess, who is variously described as stationer and bookseller, appeared as principal in a number of bonds registered between 1680 and 1690. (RD Index, xx-xxiii, xxv-xxvi, xxx. Mack. xlvi, 1, 100; 1, 855; 11, 181; 111, 208; 1xv, 343. Dal. 111, 70; lvi, 292; 1xvi, 253, 538. Dur. 1111, 330.)
- NISBET (John) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1663-73. Nisbet granted a discharge to a debtor 13 April 1663. He also appears as a witness in a disposition granted by John Geddes registered 25 Dec. 1673. (RD Index, 111, xlii. Mack. vii, 644. Dur. xxxv, 15.)
- NORVELL (William) bookbinder in Glasgow, 1698. Norvell entered the hammerman craft of Glasgow as a bookbinder, 15 Feb. 1698. (Lumsden, 290.)
- OGSTOUN (George) bookbinder in Aberdeen, 1688-96. Ogstoun was a burgess and bookbinder. He was owing James Milne, merchant in Aberdeen, 146 pounds Scots in a bond originally subscribed October 1688 and registered in 1691. He paid 34 shillings poll-tax in 1696. (APT. RD Index, xxxi. Dal. lxxiii, 209.)
- PATERSON (William) barber, parchment-maker and bookbinder in Perth, 1602. (Carnie III, 37.)
- PATERSON (William) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1697-9. Paterson registered three apprentices in these three years: James Dalgleish, 17 Nov. 1697; Martin Bryson, 30 Nov. 1698; and James Toshack, 6 Sept. 1699. It seems unlikely that this is the same man as the William Paterson, bookseller in Edinburgh, listed by previous authorities (see supra, p.118. Plomer I, 145), who flourished until 1683. If it is the same man, he was bookseller, stationer and papermaker as well as bookbinder. This earlier tradesman was described in 1663 as 'bookbinder to his Majesty'. (ERA 1666-1700. RD Index, 111, xxlii. Dal. ix, 334. Mack. 111, 789.)

- PATON (Mathew) stationer in Irvine, 1674. Will recorded, 23 April 1674. (RTG.)
- PORTEOUS (John) stationer in Edinburgh, 1700. Porteous registered an apprentice, James Williamson, 7 Feb. 1700. (ERA 1666-1700.)
- PORTEOUS (Thomas) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1609-10. (Mitchell, 124.)
- PUMPHRAY (John) bookseller in Lanark, 1691-2. Pumphray signed a bond indicating that he was owing John Colquhoun 348 merks, 21 April 1691. The deed was registered in 1692. (RD Index, xxxii. Dal. lxxiv, 630.)
- RAE (John) bookbinder in Glasgow, 10 Feb. 1659. (BGBG.)
- REID (George) printer in Edinburgh, 1688. Reid was a witness to a document concerning Lewis Shaw, bookbinder (q.v.) (RD Index, xxviii. Dal. lxxix, 1005.)
- REID (James) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1686. A James Reid served his apprenticeship with John Cairns, bookseller, the apprenticeship being registered 12 August 1668. If this bookbinder is the same man, he was probably in business a number of years before he registered Rodger Robertson as his apprentice, 7 April 1686. (ERA 1666-1700.)
- REID (Thomas) bookbinder in Edinburgh from 1644 to before Feb. 1648. (Mitchell, 124.)
- ROBERTSON or ROBIESON (John) senior, stationer in Glasgow, 1697-1728. This man is recorded by previous authorities. He was admitted burghess and master stationer in Glasgow, 6 Dec. 1697. (PED, 347. Carnie I, 154.)
- ROBINS (John) Englishman, printer to His Majesty in Edinburgh, 1650. (ERBE 1642-55, 252.)
- ROLLOCK (John) bookseller, bookbinder and parchment-maker in Perth, 1639. (Carnie III, 37.)
- ROOKS (William) Englishman, printer to His Majesty in Edinburgh, 1650. (ERBE 1642-55, 252.)
- ROSS (Helen) embroiderer of book covers, [Edinburgh?] 1538-43. (Mitchell, 19, 22, 125.)
- SALMOND (Gilbert) printer in Edinburgh, 1675. Salmond appears as a principal party owing money to other tradesmen in several bonds during this year. (RD Index, xv. Dal. xxxviii, 778; xl, 126.)
- SANDILANDS (Patrick) papermaker at Gordon's mills, Aberdeen, c.1696. (Kennedy, ii, 204.)
- SANGSTER (John) bookbinder in Old Aberdeen, 1686-1701. Sangster, son of William Sangster, fermorer and burghess, appears as a burghess and bookbinder, 6 Feb. 1686. In 1697 he was paid by the Town Council for providing a new book for the Clerk. He and his wife were listed as pollable persons in 1696 and paid the standard 18 shillings poll-tax. He bound and dressed the town's registers in 1700/1. (ROA, i, 222, 241, 356. APT.)
- SCOTT (Andrew) bookseller, bookbinder and stationer in Edinburgh, 1662-76. Scott was registered as an apprentice with George Swinton, bookseller in Edinburgh, 19 Jan. 1653. He was in business for himself by 1662, and probably before that. He registered Thomas Sprott as his apprentice, 26 Feb. 1662. From 1665 to 1676 his name is found frequently as a principal party in financial transactions. He was described as a bookseller in 1665, a stationer and bookseller in 1666, a stationer in 1669, and a bookbinder in 1676. His wife's name was Elizabeth Currie. The references to the Register of Deeds below are selected references only. (ERA 1583-1666. RD Index, v, vii, xvi. Dal. xlii, 859. Dur. xiv, 535; xli, 95.)
- SHAW (Lewis) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1688. Shaw signed a bond, 14 April 1688, in the Abbey of Holyroodhouse - a traditional sanctuary for debtors - obliging himself to repay George Adamson and James Hamilton who had paid off his debt to Alexander Ogstoun, bookseller in Edinburgh. A further bond granted to Hamilton was witnessed by Robert Allan, bookbinder in Edinburgh, 28 August 1688. This is presumably the same man as the Robert Allan, bookseller (see supra, p.107). (RD Index, xxviii. Dal. lxxix, 1005, 1038.)
- SHEILS (Gideon) stationer in Edinburgh, 1676. Sheils registered one Patrick Rutherford as his apprentice, 16 Feb. 1676. (ERA 1666-1700.)
- SIMPSON (John) bookseller in Lanark, 1679-87. In 1679 Simpson was in debt to the powerful King's printer, Agnes Campbell or Anderson. The bond is signed by Mr Alexander Glen (q.v.) and Patrick Ramsay (see supra, p.119) both in the employ of Mrs Anderson. (RD Index, xix. Dur. xlii, 620.)
- SINCLAIR (James) bookbinder [and bookseller?] in Edinburgh, 1628-39. (Mitchell, 125.)
- SMITH (Edward) journeyman printer in Edinburgh, 1678. Smith was employed in the King's House. (PC Reg. Ser. 3, v, 441-2.)
- SOCIETY OF WHITE WRITING PAPER AND PRINTING PAPER MANUFACTORY OF SCOTLAND, 1695. The articles of this company were printed [in Edinburgh?] in 1695. (Copy in British Museum: 1391.c.21.)

- STALKER (William) bookbinder in Dundee, 1675. Stalker was the grantee of a bond to one Andrew Reid, who owed him 70 pounds Scots. The deed was registered 13 Dec. 1675. (RD Index, xv. Mack. xxviii, 340.)
- STEEDMAN (Archibald) bookbinder and parchment-maker in Perth, 1587. (Carnie III, 38.)
- STEVEN (James) stationer and bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1666-73. Steven registered James Williamson as his apprentice 28 Feb. 1666, and Patrick Vaughan (Van Hagen) 29 Oct. 1673. The latter was the son of the well-known bookbinder of the same name in Aberdeen who died in 1665. (ERA 1583-1666; 1666-1700. Mitchell, 101-2.)
- STEVENSON (Mrs Martha) bookseller in Edinburgh, 1692-4. There are extant accounts of Mrs Stevenson selling books in this period to the first Earl of Seafield. (Seafield.)
- STEVINSTOUNE (John) bookbinder in Glasgow, 1680. Burgess as serving apprenticeship with James Brown, bookbinder, 30 Sept. 1680. (BGEG.)
- STEWART (G.) bookseller, Edinburgh, 1690. (See supra, no. 3043.5.)
- STEWART (William) bookseller, bookbinder and stationer in Paisley, 1680-90. Stewart was a principal party in two documents registered 11 May and 24 May 1680. He was in debt to the extent of 144 pounds Scots to Mrs Agnes Campbell, relict of Andrew Anderson (see supra, p.108), in the bond registered 24 May 1680. This bond is witnessed by Alexander Ogstoun, stationer in Edinburgh (see supra, p.118). He is referred to as William Stewart, bookbinder in Paisley, in a document registered 23 July 1690. (RD Index, xx-xxii. Mack. xvii, 243; xlix, 745. Dur. xvii, 428. Dal. lxxi, 1172.)
- STEWART (William) stationer and bookseller in Glasgow, 1682-3. Stewart describes himself as bookseller and burgess of Glasgow. (RD Index, xxii-xxiii. Dur. liv, 576; lv, 583.)
- STORIE (Joseph) printer in Edinburgh, 1667. Storie registered Andrew Ker, son to William Ker (q.v.), printer in Aberdeen as his apprentice 28 August 1667. (ERA 1666-1700.)
- SWAN (Robert) journeyman printer in Edinburgh, 1694. Swan's wife is named in the poll-tax return for 1694 as Marion Flucker. (PTRE, 64.)
- SWELLS (James) barber and stationer in Perth, 1697. (Carnie II [SB, xv] 116.)
- SWINTOUN (James) bookseller and stationer in Edinburgh, 1679-81. Indentures between James Swintoun, stationer burgess in Edinburgh and William Mitchell, apprentice, were made at Edinburgh 19 Dec. 1679, and registered 12 July 1680. Swintoun also appears in two bonds registered in 1681. (RD Index, xx-xxi. Mack. xvii, 524; xlix, 6, 710.)
- SYM (James) bookbinder in Perth, c.1595. (Mitchell, 125.)
- TENNENT (John) bookseller in Edinburgh, 1690. Probably a graduate. Described as Mr John Tennent. (Carnie II [SB, xv] 116.)
- THOMSON (James) journeyman printer in Edinburgh, 1678. A workman in the King's House. (PC Reg. Ser. 3, v, 441-2.)
- THOMSON (Robert) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1644-60. (Mitchell, 125.)
- THOMSON (William) stationer in Aberdeen, 1696. Thomson, whose stock was valued at under 5,000 merks, and had a servant called Margaret Harrow, paid a high poll-tax in 1696. He may have been related to the Peter or Patrick Thompson, bookbinder in Aberdeen, 1696-9 (see supra, p.121), whose name also appears in the 1696 poll-tax rolls. (APT.)
- THOMSONE (Thomas) Englishman, printer to His Majesty in Edinburgh, 1650. (ERBE 1642-55, 252.)
- TRAILL (David) bookbinder and cleric in Stirling, 1503-4. (Mitchell, 18, 125.)
- TURNBULL (William) [bookseller?] in Edinburgh, 1694. (Carnie I, 157.)
- TWYN (John) printer in Edinburgh, 1650. (ERBE 1642-55, 252.)
- WACKER (John) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1669-76. In this period Wacker registered three apprentices: John Gordon, 23 June 1669; Andrew Collier (Coalzier), 4 March 1674; and James Lundie, 16 August 1676. (ERA 1666-1700.)
- WARRENDER (Thomas) printer in Edinburgh, 1694. Warrender's name is to be found in the College Kirk parish poll-tax rolls. He had an apprentice called William Tarbit. (PTRE.)
- WATT (Andrew) barber, bookbinder and stationer in Perth, 1676. (Carnie II [SB, xv] 118.)
- WATT (John) bookseller, bookbinder and parchment-maker in Perth, 1670. (Carnie II [SB, xv] 118.)

WILSON (Charles) printer in Edinburgh, 1667. Wilson registered an apprentice, Patrick Bryson, on 27 Nov. 1667. (ERA 1666-1700.)

WILSON (John) stationer in Glasgow, 29 Sept. 1692. (BGBG.)

WINCHESTER (James) bookbinder in Glasgow, 1628. (Mitchell, 127.)

WINCHESTER (James) bookbinder in Glasgow, 1664. Burgess as eldest lawful son to the deceased James Winchester, bookbinder, 11 Feb. 1664. (BGBG.)

WINNIE or WINNING (Robert) bookbinder in Dumfries, 1695-1727. This tradesman is mentioned in the Dumfries Town Council Records.

WRITTEN (Daniel) Englishman, printer to His Majesty in Edinburgh, 1650. (ERBE 1642-55, 252.) John Wreittoun's brother was called Daniel. (See supra p.124.)

YOUNG (James) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1640-2. (Mitchell, 127.)

YOUNG (John) an embroiderer who covered books for the King [Edinburgh?] 1541-3. (Mitchell, 20, 127.)

YOUNG (John) bookbinder in Edinburgh, 1647. (Mitchell, 127.)
